

We love to help out where we can with physical needs of the local churches. In this case, hooking up a team (Lon Smith's team from The River Ministries in Nevada) who needed a project, with a church (Javier Gill's church in Basconcobe) who needed a roof. Result: a bunch of happy people. An interesting aside, our original plan was to build a roof for mission church in las Parras, but some people in Obregon, Sonora had been planning on doing this for a couple years and when they found out 'Gringos' were going to do it, they jumped in and committed to doing it in November, so The River builds one roof and motivates another!

This Thanksgiving season, we have so much to be grateful for. First of all, a God who provides, protects and has given us this wonderful job!

We feel a little like the pilgrims who survived the first difficult winter and are settled-in and more established. Electricity, friends, home, office, ELECTRICITY, a reasonable (if less than ideal) water solution, air conditioning, covered patio with concrete floor (did I mention electricity?) to name a few.

We are so very grateful for our supporters that are helping make this work a reality.

Also for the Mexican staff that work with us daily to get the ministry done.

We are thankful to finally have a roof on the new office / work room! And just in time. We will be pouring the floor and installing doors in November and we will have a usable work room. We are very excited as we are already running out of storage space for next-years' materials.

This new room will be used as a production area and storage space for printed materials. It will be so nice not having stacks of paper boxes and production equipment around the house! Not to mention being able to leave the different production stations set-up without having to re-configure the space every time we change jobs.

But, most of all, we are thankful to God who gave us this mission and is providing ALL the needs to see it through!


Guarjio Trip

The Church of God regional office invited us to attend their annual missions trip into the mountains. This is their second year ministering to the Guarjio (pronounced Wadahio), an indigenous tribe. We went up with children's ministry materials, evangelism CDs and cassettes and some tracts in Guarjio. These people are poor and isolated, living in really harsh conditions and largely on government subsidies.



We had a really eye-opening experience giving young marijuana farmer a ride down the mountain. He was surprisingly open about his trade and even showed us video of his field on his cell phone. It was interesting to see another side of life as it is a major influence in the mountains.

Lon Smith and his team from Nevada visited us again this year, and a great visit it was. We worked primarily in Basconcobe where we built almost all of a roof for a mission church and held a well-attended outreach meeting. It was encouraging for the church for us to meet with them three times during the week.

Their last night here, we visited the local graveyard where locals were celebrating Dia de la Muertos (Day of the Dead) where they offer prayers at grave sites of relatives and light candles.
